NEIGHBOURHOOD PLANNING

In November, everyone in the village, including Parish Businesses, will be receiving a questionnaire. This will ask you for your views of many aspects of Hayton and Tiln Parish which will help develop a plan that will assist change and development of the village over the next 10-15 years.

Hayton and Tiln Neighbourhood Planning Group along with experts from Bassetlaw District Council and consultants OpenPlan will use your information within a planning framework to develop a plan for the future development of the village. This plan will form part of the Bassetlaw Local Plan which identifies development needs for the region – in particular the development of land to meet future housing needs and associated amenities.

Key within the plan is the availability and suitability of land within the Parish boundary for the development of housing. Sites have Already been made available and will be considered within the village plan. You will be able to have your say in approving the plan once complete.

For those walkers with dogs, it is acceptable not to have them on a lead except where there is livestock in the field or the dog may be a danger to other members of the public or other dogs. Don't forget your poo bags!!

GARDENING TIPS OCTOBER 2020

Gardening has really come into its own this year with the Covid restrictions, providing mental and physical relief for those incarcerated at home or unable to work. Gardens are still colourful with many plants blooming well, including dahlias, cosmos, nicotianas, chrysanthemums and fuchsias. Some salvias are still in flower and I have been especially impressed by Salvia "Hot Lips" that has flowered profusely since May. The small tubular red and white flowers attract pollinators and the evergreen leaves are highly aromatic.

It is well worth taking photos of your perennials that die down in the winter to help planning for next years. It will provide a record of location, size and flower colour. It is also useful for identifying corms and tubers that you store over winter.

Tender plants need to be brought in under cover now. This is obviously easier for those in pots. Smaller plants in the ground can be dug up and potted but large plants need a protective covering. Fleece is generally suitable and is available as bags in various sizes that fit snugly over plants. Any medium sized fruit on fig trees should be removed as they will rot in the winter. Any up to pea size can be left as they may survive, especially if given frost protection.

Decaying material in ponds and veg patches and leaves on ponds and lawns should be removed. Lawns can be repaired, scarified and treated with autumn feed. Potted fruit trees can be planted any time between September and May whereas bare root trees should only be planted in winter when roots are dormant. If your garden is small, and you have a wall or other suitable support, consider espaliers. It requires some preparation in fixing support wires and care in training branches but it is low maintenance thereafter, ornamental and the fruit is very accessible. Spring cabbage and wall flowers should be planted out now as well as daffodils and other spring bulbs but tulips are best left until November.
